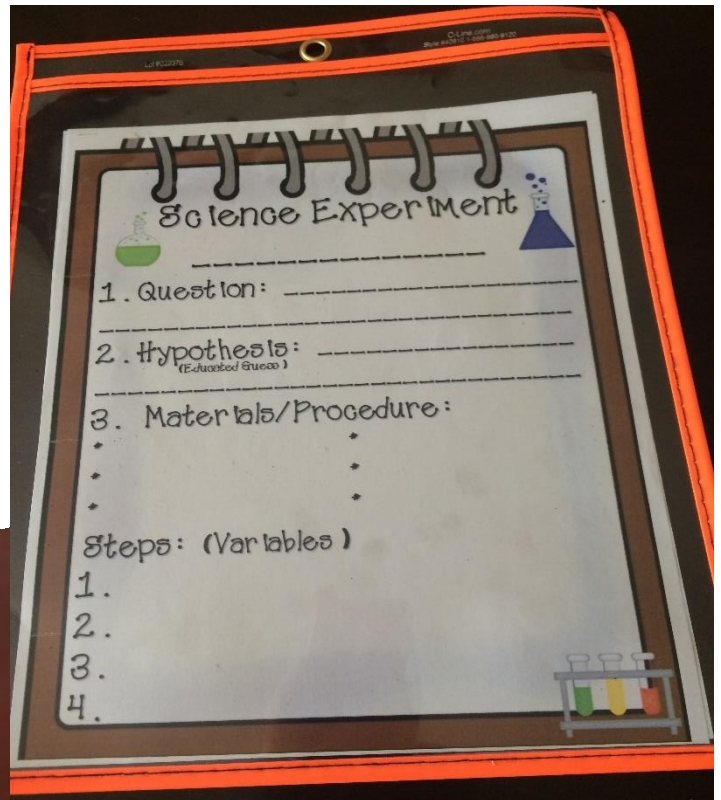


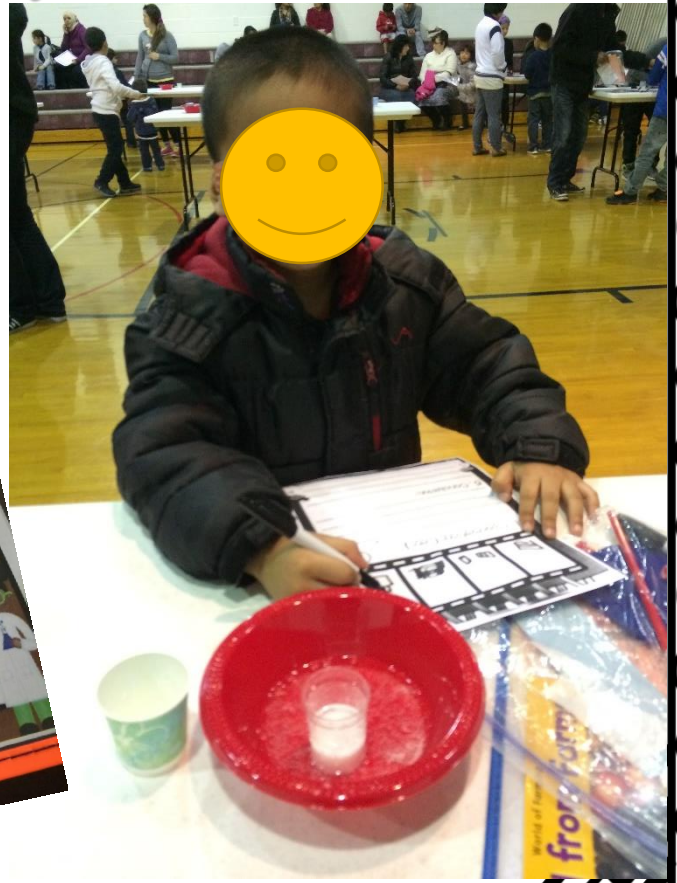
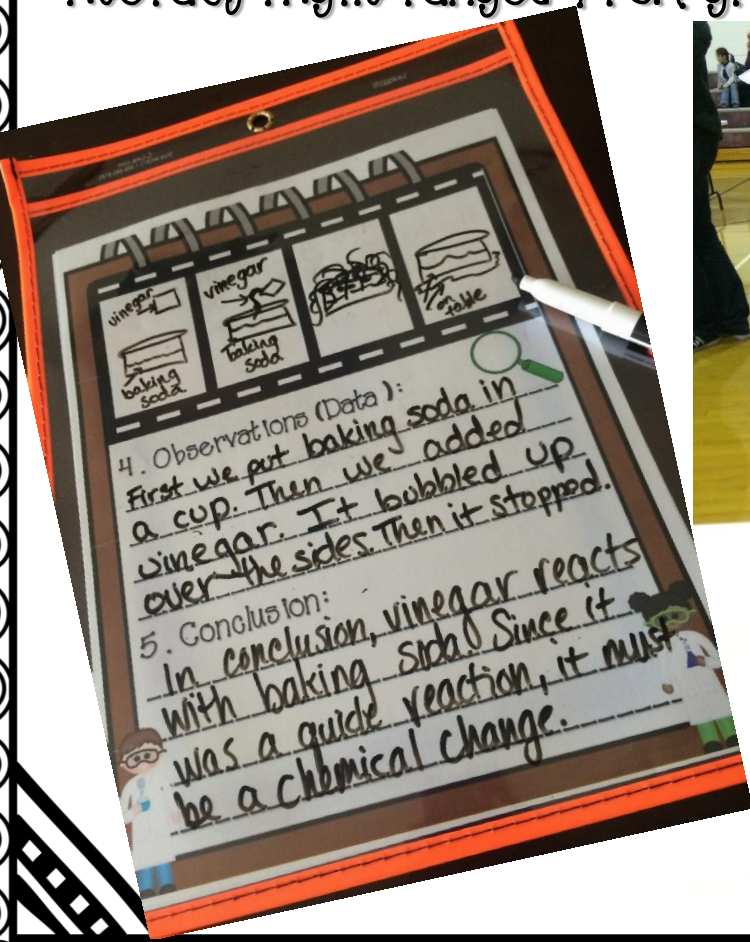
Instructions!

Instructions!

We were emphasizing how writing in a sequence for a story with correct punctuation and grammar is the same writing techniques we use in science. They needed to ask a question, write down the steps they took (so it could be replicated), draw/write what they observed in order, and then draw a conclusion. We were pointing out the connection between story writing and non-fiction/science writing. Our literacy night ranged from grades K-5.
